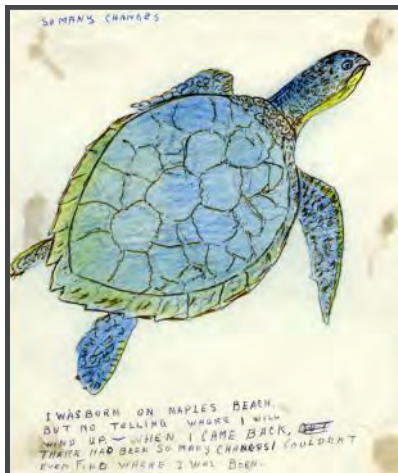

At A Glance

Paintings by Florida artist, Robert Lee Storter, Jr. (1894-1987) are featured in this exhibit. His largely untutored and unvarnished style chronicles a time when much of southwest Florida was considered America's last frontier. A product of his environment, he earned his living by fishing, guiding, and boating. His days spent in the waters of the Ten Thousand Islands; and the hammocks and prairies of the Everglades, made him a keen observer of nature.



He drew the countless fish and birds that once darkened the waters and the skies, remarking that now creatures in such numbers are *“never no more.”*

Rob's portrayal of the Everglades is a celebration of the attendant exuberance and beauty of a frontier land that he understood and loved.

The exhibition was developed by Donna M. Shelley, past manager of the Museum of the Everglades, Everglades City, Florida, in conjunction with Jennifer Guida, Curator of Collections, Collier County Museums, and the Friends of the Museum of the Everglades.

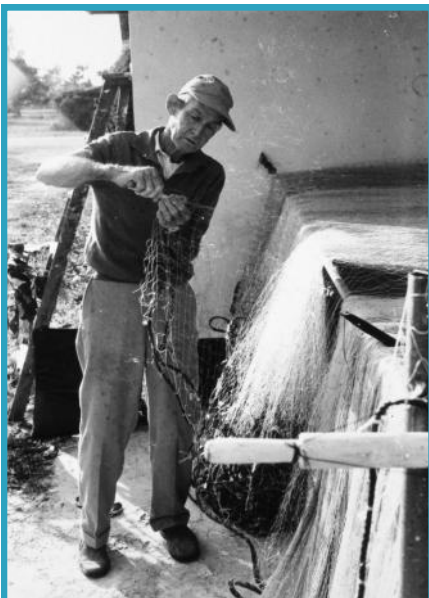

The History of Daily Life

Rob Storter's artwork provides us with a window into the daily life of the Everglades and Ten Thousand Islands region. From hunting scenes to fishing boats, and tractors on the farm, his work allows us to see past our notions of southwest Florida as a mysterious, wild landscape; and more as a resilient and vibrant community.

Environment

Storter was a keen observer of nature and documented the abundance of southwest Florida's flora and fauna in his paintings. A variety of fish and other sea-life, as well as wild boar, bears, and native plants are exhibited in his art. Storter shows how people not only used their natural environment as a resource, but how they learned to coexist with their wild neighbors, as well as documenting its noted depletion with development.

Art & Culture

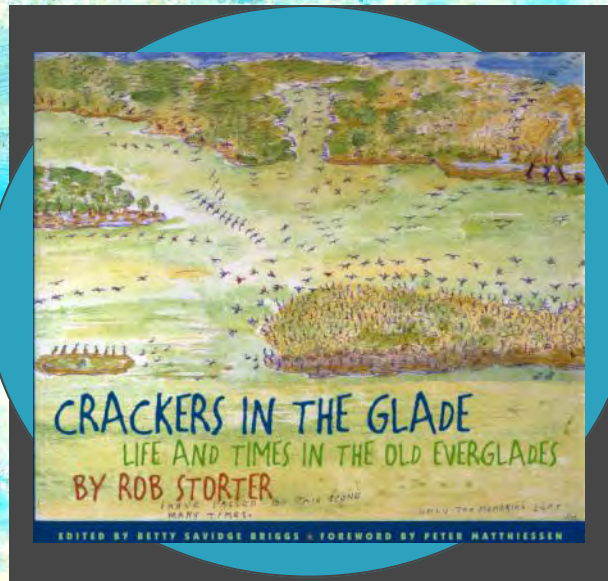
